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Giorgio Agamben (/ æ m b n /; Italian: ; born 22 April 1942) is an Italian philosopher best known for his work investigating the concepts of the state of exception, form-of-life (borrowed from Ludwig Wittgenstein) and homo sacer. The concept of biopolitics (carried forth from the work of Michel Foucault) informs many of his writings.

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Controversial simplifications of Giorgio Agamben's philosophy continue to raise the ire of many around the humanities: experience is now impossible, the world is irreparable, the concentration camps represent the modern age, everyone is homo sacer, etc. Murray and de la Durantaye's books may not succeed in alleviating this outrage, but they contribute handsomely to the literature dedicated to ensuring that it is not based on misunderstandings.

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
